LP to CD


Convert vinyl records and tapes to CDs

What you need

- Record player with pre-amplifier/equalizer
 (your Hi-Fi system with line output will work. You can now buy USB turntables that plug directly into the Mac)
- or a tape player with line output (headphone)
- Cables (RCA or mini plugs, depending...)
- Mac with audio input jack (or USB port plus adapter)
- Recording software
- CD burner and software (e.g. iTunes)

The Basic Setup




Phonograph cartridges put out weak signals that need pre-amplification and equalization.

Tape players work directly.

USB Audio

- Some iMacs, eMacs and G4's don't have audio input jacks
- Use iMic (\$40) or Instant Music USB adapters (\$60)
- Even if you have audio jacks
 USB audio gives better quality
 and frees up the audio ports



G5 iMacs and Intel MacBooks have audio input jacks






